A Message from our Regional Minister: Kathleen White, OFS

The Lord give you peace! It's that time of vear when the word PEACE is used as decorations for Christmas and the New Year. Wall hangings and ornaments and mantel displays are an example. Francis taught that the greeting - The Lord give you peace! - be used by the friars as they entered villages and homes. We should do the same. Peace in the family is stressed often. Healing of memories, avoiding arguments, married love, the raising of children and grandchildren, all call for Peace? What brings us to peace in our lives? The presence of the Lord? Friendship? A good day on the job? A restful night of sleep? Let us teach peace as part of our Advent preparation for the Second Coming, and as part of our conversion for the new vear.

We are preparing for the 2019 Elective Chapter planned for 4/13/19. As is true in the local fraternities, Regional Fraternities also hold a triennial election. You are asked to prayerfully consider two things – nominating yourself or another for an office on the Regional Executive Council (Minister, Vice Minister, Secretary, Treasurer, Formation Director, Northeast Councilor, Northwest Councilor, Central Councilor). We are called to service by our profession, our promise to follow the Rule, by what is written in our Essential Documents, and by our Catholicity. We are called by the Scriptures. Romans 12:7-8 says: *if it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is giving, let him give generously; if it is leading, let him lead with diligence; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully.* 

Scripture also tells us that we are many parts, but all one body. The eye is not the hand. The foot is not the ear. But all are necessary. So it is with leadership. The call is to use the gifts we have for the (re)building of the Kingdom, of which our Regional Fraternity is a part. Look around you. Who in your fraternity has gifts and talents that the Regional Fraternity can benefit from? Better yet – look in the mirror! What have you received along your journey that you can give back through servant leadership?



# A Reflection from Tina Popiela, OFS,

Formation Director of Our Lady of Lourdes Fraternity

The following meditation was in the newsletter for OUR LADY OF LOURDES FRATERNITY, and it seemed too good not to share.

The main theme of Father Mike's talk at Unity Day was forgiveness. He reminded us that as Franciscans, we are people of penance. Now we usually think of penance as some form of punishment like not putting that box of fudge bars into your grocery cart. Yet in

Franciscan thought, penance has a different meaning. When God called Francis to rebuild a broken church, he did not mean it literally. God had a much larger picture in mind; that of rebuilding a broken world.

In their pride, Adam and Eve rejected God's plan. They broke faith with him. In penance, we try to repair that brokenness. One way to do this is through forgiveness. I'm sure we have all experienced being hurt by someone. Often we carry that hurt with us like a heavy weight. When we are hurting, it is difficult to forgive. It is like a fresh wound that will not heal.

Father Mike said that even Jesus experience this difficulty. His words on the cross were, "Father forgive them . . ." In his pain, Jesus asked the Father to forgive. Yes as followers of Jesus and Francis, we must forgive. This is so important that Jesus included it in his prayer. We will be forgiven as we forgive. We must repair what is broken.

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As I thought about this, I wondered about the other side of forgiveness, the one where we are the one who has caused the hurt. To ask for forgiveness is also a difficult thing. No one wans to admit to being wrong. We can forgive someone without

confronting the person. However, in asking for forgiveness we must approach the one we hurt. We must present ourselves being humble and contrite. Our apology may be accepted or be rejected. No matter if we need to forgive or need forgiveness, we must do our best to repair that brokenness. If we profess to following the Gospel, then there is never a question about forgiveness.

As our Brother Francis told us: "As surely as you love the Lord and me, see to it that no brother in the whole world, no matter how badly he has sinned, is ever allowed to go away from you without forgiveness, if he asks for it. And if he comes a thousand times with sin, then love him altogether more than you love me, so that you may draw him to the Lord. And always be merciful to such persons."



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## Stepping Out of the Box

A few weeks ago, I took a ride out to Crown Point to do a little shopping at one of my favorite stores. It was a particularly windy and cold day with the wind coming down from the north. As I left the store to return to my car, I noticed a young man sitting on a stoop between store fronts. He was dressed in Bermuda shorts, gym shoes without shoe laces or socks and a short sleeve tee shirt.

As he sat there shivering from the cold, he had a can of orang pop sitting on the ground next to him, while holding a cigarette. He had to be in his late teens or early twenties.

As I passed him by, I thought about stopping to see if I could do anything for him, but thought better of it because of all the horrific stories you hear these days. But it bothered me to no end that I didn't reach out to try to help. I thought about my own kids (who are all adults) and the family life they had growing up, and wondered where this young man's family was.

I realized that we can't help everyone we meet who needs some kind of assistance, but as Franciscans, we need to be like the Good Samaritan and do whatever we can to make a difference. I missed a golden opportunity to help this fellow and regret that I didn't do anything. Although it's too late now, I pray for him that he finds the love, compassion and the help he needs.

This is a prime example of stepping out of the box as we heard at our last retreat. We should see the face of Christ in those we encounter, and although it's not always easy, being charitable should come second nature to us as Franciscans and Christians. With Thanksgiving just passed, think of all the blessings you have received throughout the year, and try to do something positive for those who are in need.

## Pilgrims Reflect on their Journey

The following two reflections were sent by two of our Pilgrims from Our Lady of Indiana Regional Fraternity who were gifted with time in Assisi in October, 2019.

For the last few weeks I've been gently reflecting on the images and memories from our 10 day pilgrimage to Rome and Assisi. I still remember how it felt to have the warm



Umbrian sun surround me as I padded along the cobblestone streets far above the mist covered valley below. I cannot forget, too, the experience of watching Paulo fit our taxi through impossible spaces on the narrow streets of the city!

One image I keep returning to is that of the live doves nestled in the arms of the statue of St. Francis by the rose garden at St. Mary of the Angels Basilica. We, too, in a sense were "nestled" in the arms of Assisi itself, birthplace to Francis, Clare, as well as the Franciscan Order.

Assisi is a city which has endured the test of time, made forever holy by the saints' lives. For over 800 years, people have flocked to this "City of Peace". Spending time in the sacred places of San Damiano, San Rufino, Our Lady of the Angels, San Ciara, the Portiuncula, Basilica of San Francesco one cannot help but encounter God's divine presence. It is the same God who touched Francis' heart; and the same God who touched my heart while I was there. Many insights continue to emerge from my time spent in Assisi.

What images or notions come to mind with the word PEACE? A baby sleeping? Prayers for a family when their loved one who has died may rest in peace? The novel <u>War and</u> <u>Peace</u>? The greeting "Peace be with you!". Queen of Peace? Or, especially toward the end of the year, "Peace on earth and good will to !"

Secular Franciscans are guided by our Rule article 19 which includes the following:

> "Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon.

Messengers of perfect joy in every circumstance, they should strive to bring joy and hope to others."





The P in our JPIC has been associated with Franciscans from the beginning. In 2018, our *Handbook for Animators of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation* was revised. You can search secularfranciscansusa.org/jpic/ to open a copy under "resources". It is available for all of us, not just those in leadership.

Working for peace happens at an individual, local level all the way to a group, international level. We start by removing the hate around and within us. This quote stuck out at a recent Presidential funeral: "Hatred corrodes the container it is carried in." We hear from Vatican II that "Christians should cooperate, willingly and wholeheartedly, in building an international order based on genuine respect for legitimate freedom and on a brotherhood of universal friendship."

"BEING PEACE" (handbook,p.22), states that Francis and Clare greeted the people of Assisi with Pace e Bene! Peace and Good!

What are some peace principles? There is minimal space to name them here, with hope to cover them later: PRAYER, EMPATHY, ACTIVE LISTENING, COMPASSION, and EVANGELICAL LOVE. Perhaps the "Active Listening" trait attributed to a former President deserves mention at this time.
