

Our Regional Prayer

Holy Virgin Mary, there is no one like you born in the world among women: Daughter and Handmaid of the most high, sovereign King, the heavenly Father, Mother of our most holy Lord Jesus Christ, Spouse of the Holy Spirit.

Pray for us with St. Michael the archangel and with all the powers of the heavens and with all the saints together with your most holy beloved Son, Lord and Teacher. This year, 2021, marks the 8th centenary of the Rule of 1221, which is quite important to the whole Franciscan family of Orders. It is also important to the Church as a whole, since St. Francis received a commission when he was meditating on the crucifix at San Damiano some years before: "Go and rebuild my Church."

We all know the story how he then began to acquire what was needed to rebuild that particular dilapidated church. We also know that the commission meant far more than that. It was a call to serve the Church as a whole. In his poverty, he witnessed to the riches of the life of the Church: the Gospels, the Sacraments, and its teaching. In the midst of the struggles of his time, he witnessed the joy, peace, and fulfillment of a true son of the Church. In his weakness, he witnessed the call to servanthood.

St. Francis wrote two letters to the Brothers and Sisters of Penance. The second letter was written following the Fourth Lateran Council and on his return from the

Middle East. What could this document possibly have for us today?

Over the next few years, the International Council will be emphasizing our call to servant leadership.

This second letter to our Order gives us a kind of framework to go by. Francis describes himself as a servant to all, in spite of his bodily weakness. He speaks of the angel Gabriel who served by delivering the message of the Incarnation to Mary, who in turn accepted her vocation to serve as the mother of the Son of God. Francis goes on to describe how Jesus served the disciples at table during the Last Supper and then served all of humanity by his sacrifice "on the altar of the cross." (FA:ED, page 46). Jesus continues to serve us by being "present on the altar in the hands of a priest" when he "so humbles Himself that for our salvation He hides Himself

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Francis's Gift to the "Brothers and Sisters of Penance"

"Brother Francis, their servant and subject, sends esteem and reverence, true peace from heaven and sincere love in the Lord to all Christian religious people: clergy and laity, men and women, and to all who live in the whole world.

Because I am the servant of all, I am obliged to serve all and to administer the fragrant words of my Lord to them. Therefore, realizing that I could not visit each one of you personally because of sickness and the weakness of my body, I decided to offer you in this letter and message the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the Word of the Father, and the words of the Holy Spirit, which are spirit and life (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 45)."

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under an ordinary piece of bread!" (ibid, *Letter to the Entire Order*, page 118). The most beautiful call and the essence of our servanthood comes at the end of this short passage in this letter: "Hold back nothing of yourselves for yourselves, that He Who gives Himself totally to you may receive you totally!" (ibid)

Servanthood, and, in fact, servant leadership, requires humility and total generosity. It may or may not mean that any one of us may be called upon to serve on the Council - at any level of fraternity. It may or may not mean that any one of us may be called to serve in a soup kitchen. It may or may not mean that any one of us may be called to be a reader at Mass. It may or may not mean a lot of things. What is absolutely DOES mean is that we offer ourselves freely and generously to whatever we are called to do.

As I explain to those in initial formation, servant leadership isn't necessarily an elected position or a position with authority. Servant leadership in the Franciscan tradition is being an example of what it means to live as Jesus and Francis (and Clare, too!) lived.

Show Mercy to His Brothers

"And let him have and show mercy to each of his brothers as he would want them to do to him were he in a similar position."

> St. Francis of Assisi Second Letter to the Faithful

Reread Chapter 2 of our Rule – slowly and carefully. Read the Second Letter to the Brothers and Sisters of Penance if you have it in a volume somewhere. What does each article mean to you and for you?

I'll close with the words of St. Francis himself at the end of this letter.

"I, brother Francis, your lesser servant, with a wish to kiss your feet, beg and implore you in the love that is God, to receive, to put into practice, and to observe, as you should, these words and the others of our Lord Jesus Christ with humility and love." (FA:ED, *Second Letter*, page 51.)

"The most high Father made known from heaven through His holy angel Gabriel this Word of the Father, so worthy, so holy and glorious — in the womb of the holy and Glorious Virgin Mary, from whose womb He received the flesh of our humanity and frailty. Though he was rich, He wished together with the most Blessed Virgin, His mother, to choose poverty in the world beyond all else. (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 46)."

The journey of St. Francis to Damietta and his significant conversation with Malek-al-Kamel, was fruitful in many ways: his unflinchable belief in

the Providence of God, his ability to dialogue with someone considered an "enemy", his courage in the face of potential martyrdom, and so many other things.

Another precious gift to our Order was his composition of the SECOND LETTER TO THE BROTHERS AND SISTERS OF PENANCE written after his return in 1221 from Egypt. Though Francis seems to have received Luchesio and his wife Buonadonna already in 1209 when visiting the area near Poggibonzi, the <u>Franciscan Book of Saints</u> puts it this way:

"If Luchesio and Buonadonna were really the first Tertiaries, they must have become such not long after St. Francis founded his First Order in 1209. The first simple rule of life, which St. Francis gave to the first Tertiaries at that time, was supplanted in 1221 by one which Cardinal Hugolino prepared in legal word-wording. And in the same year Pope Honorius III approved this rule verbally. For this reason the year 1221 is often given as the date of the founding of the Third Order of St. Francis (Fran Herald Press, 1959)."

In any case, the SECOND LETTER TO THE BROTHERS AND SISTERS OF PENANCE written by Francis in 1221 laid the foundations for all families of the Third Order that were to come: that of the Secular Franciscan Order as well as the Third Order Regular of St. Francis both men and women's communities. Thus we see that the recipients of this letter were then as they are now ". . . all Christians who had committed themselves to living more intensely their baptismal commitment through a life of penance (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 45)."

The content of Francis' letter is a clear invitation to ways of conversion, the ways his followers live fraternally, the joy of poverty, and certainly the important of the Eucharist, Reconciliation, and Prayer. A serious, prayerful reading and reflection of this powerful letter, shows it to be a magnificent roadmap for following, not only in the footsteps of St. Francis, but a sure way of allowing ourselves to be transformed more and more into the image of Jesus — the one about which St. Clare wrote so eloquently by her use of the mirror image. Of this comparison Fr. Murray Bodo, OFM, wrote:

"By looking into the mirror who is Christ and recognizing yourself, you become a mirror of Him whom you contemplate, and you in turn mirror, through Christ to the Father, all the creation. You see yourself both *in* a mirror and *as* a mirror (Murray Bodo OFM, *THE WAY* *OF ST. FRANCIS – The Challenge of Franciscan Spirituality for Everyone,* Cincinnati, OH: St. Anthony Messenger Press, 1995, pages 29-31.)

But this is exactly the message give to us by our Holy Father, St. Francis so long ago when he asked us to receive, practice, and observe these word of our Lord Jesus Christ. During the year as we celebrate the composition of this letter, may we all become more like the image we reflect upon in this precious letter!



"By how happy and blessed are those who love God and so as the Lord Himself says in the Gospel: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself. Let us love God, therefore and adore Him with a pure heart and a pure mind, because He Who seeks this above all things has said: True adorers adore the Father in Spirit and Truth. For all who adore Him must adore Him in the Spirit of truth. And day and night let us direct praises and prayers to Him, saying; Our Father Who art in heaven . . . for we should pray always and not become weary (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 46– 47)."

Prophets are anointed peoples by dint of the attributes breathed into them when God created them. We are prophets. You and I are designed in such a way that you hear the Holy Spirit in a frequency and a decibel that is different from mine because each prophecy was made only for one unique pair of ears.

Love is the catching creative force by which the prophet receives and transmits the message so that it can be heard in its proper context and serve its intended transformative purpose. The prophecy, the prophet and the love are confluent.

I cannot fathom the measures of Our God the Father's LOVE for humanity that He will sacrifice His only begotten Son to reconcile us to Himself after our first parents' poor choices that affected the whole created world for all time. (Can you imagine, we could be in paradise right now if it were not for their thoughtlessness...sigh!) It was as if God was seized by love of you and me and everyone on earth that He cannot help Himself but save us from our limited selves.

When we are captive in the throes of love (Love=God=Pursuing only the good of the other), the quality and the quantity of our service will be creative to infinity. Franciscans are ahead of the curve in this. Franciscans are marked by their vow of poverty. This vow is unique and missional in that it is a way of life where one is not bogged down by the requirements of a complicated life. Hence the Franciscan is agile in extending his presence to another in need. Promptness in service to one outside of oneself is Franciscan.

Perhaps Franciscans are "born" for such a time as ours, a time when church hierarchy led by our Pope Francis spots the light on St. Francis' openness to peoples of all persuasions, to birds and animals, and to all of creation to fulfill the prophecy of rebuilding God's church.

There used to be two parallel universes in our world: the hopeful and the hopeless. It used to be the hopeless is unseen, residing in the underbelly of polite society but now, the hopelessness is emerging into the light of day everywhere. The unpretentiousness of wickedness in all sectors of society are alarming and oppressive to the soul because we cannot deny that it exists like we used to. How are we to respond to the call of the Pope as Franciscan Seculars, personally, locally, regionally and internationally? May I hazard a few intuitions on the personal and local in the form of wishes:

I wish for a rigorous inductive study of the Sacred Scriptures because St. Francis calls us to live the Gospel. Jesus The Christ said Himself, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished." (Matthew 5:17-18, NRSV). We cannot be properly creative in our conduct (orthopraxy) without proper beliefs (orthodoxy). We have to hear Jesus' "Sermon on The Mount" in Matthew 5, 6, and 7 (NRSV) which is His prescription for a blessed way of life.

Leaving the world of commerce and knighthood was a phenomenon and still is even in our era of material wealth and honor – how did St. Francis do that? Why and how was it that St. Claire had the burden for the poor?

As a corollary to the above, I wish for an "in-depth study in community" of

the Franciscan martyrs. What was it about Maximilian Kolbe that made him choose death in the stead of another? What made Marianne Cope decide to leave her healthy life in Syracuse, New York to live with and care for the lepers in Molokai? What made Thomas More prefer beheading to a stellar life set in politics?

I wish for true community in which one can know where the sisters and brothers are coming from so we can love each other. We cannot love each other if I do not know you and you do not know me. We cannot pray for each other profoundly and sincerely if we are strangers. Will we allow this vulnerability? I realize there are two sides to the coin of "knowing" but are we Franciscan enough to find joy in and with one another? Can we purify our thoughts and the meditations of our hearts (Psalm 19:14, NRSV) by avoiding prejudice, judgment, condescension, patronizing, rudeness, unhappiness in our differences of opinions? Can we look at each other as God means for us to see each other as someone so very important for whom His Son was crucified? **How can I harm you** when I "know" your troubles, your dreams, your cares, your losses?

If so, can we thusly attract others to join us, a peaceable and a patient fraternity, until Franciscan spirituality and thought covers the earth?

And oh, I lied...I also have one, big wish for the regional and international organizations... and that is to come together in a huge retreat! What a festival of Franciscans – just conjuring the possibility in my mind makes me happy! I cannot wait for "Unity Day" to arrive...is it August yet?

"We must also frequently visit churches and venerate and revere the clergy not so much for themselves, if they are sinners, but because of their office and administration of the most holy Body and Blood of Christ which they sacrifice upon the altar, received and administer others. And let all of us know for certain that no one can be saved except through the holy words and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which the clergy pronounce, proclaim and minister (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p.47-48)."


A SPECIAL PRAYER REQUEST
