Sociedad de Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe: Welcome

As they begin their journey toward becoming a fraternity, all of us would like to say "Welcome to our Franciscan family" to the men and women of the "Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe" (Sociedad de Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe)" in Fort Wayne. At this point, the group may be called a "Society" but the designation "fraternity" does not come until the necessary conditions have been completed over the course of the next years.

On April 16, 2021, the National Spiritual Assistants (CNSA) and the National Executive Council (NEA) approved ad experimentum the "Guide to Canonical Establishment of a Secular Franciscan Fraternity" a twenty three page description of the "Pathway to Canonical Establishment". This document is available for downloading and study from the national fraternity's website as indicated here: www.secularfranciscansusa.org

Under the inspiration of a woman from Mexico, already a professed Secular Franciscan, several enthusiastic men and women contacted Fr. Jose Arroyo, Pastor of St. Paul's Parish in Columbia City, sharing their wish to become a Franciscan Third Order Fraternity.

With that question, the journey had begun for them, and Sister Agnes Marie, OSF, Regional Spiritual Assistant, and Sr. Anita, OSF, Spiritual Assistant of St. Michael the Archangel Fraternity in Hicksville, OH, as well as the Regional Executive Council, began studying the "Guide" and leading the

"Newly Forming Group" (Guidelines pp. 6–9) one step at a time . . .a process that continues up to this moment and which will continue into the future. What a gift they are to our Regional family of Franciscans!

Early in our "getting-to-knowyou" sessions, the group expressed their wish to be known and dedicated to "Our Lady of Guadalupe", thus their beautiful title.

The Regional Executive Council at their September meeting accepted their formal petition to begin the process and Sr. Anita stepped forward along with Chris Bercaw, OFS, to provide hands on guidance of this budding group of to-be Franciscans, who continue to meet every Friday evening for Scripture sharing and study of Franciscan reflections.

Both the "Society" and the Regional Council have faithfully executed the steps listed in the

"Canonical Guide" to this point, so the little family is firmly on its way.

The "Newly Forming Group" of potential Franciscans is now meeting at the University of St. Francis in Fort Wayne, and the Regional Executive Council has approved their being placed in the care of St. Michael the Archangel Fraternity as their sponsoring fraternity. The fraternity has accepted that role. Cyndi Pilot, OFS, Regional Minister, Barb Braley, OFS, Regional Formation Director, and Chris Bercaw, OFS, Minister of St. Michael's Fraternity attended this meeting to greet, welcome, and get to know these good aspirants.

At their next meeting in November, along with other preliminary steps as contained in the "Guidelines", they will begin their study of "The Journey (La Journada)" and their "Pathway to Profession" — the same three year process as all aspirants who present themselves for entrance to the Secular Franciscan Order undertake.

Celebrating the "CENTENARIO"

In our last newsletter, we spoke of the "Centenario" announced by the six ministers of the "Conference of the Franciscan Family" on January 1, 2022. They gave us a framework by which each region and / or fraternity could enter into the commemoration of the 800th anniversaries of the Later Rule in 2022, Christmas at Greccio in 2023, the Stigmata in 2024, and the Canticle of the Creatures in 2025. We will, from time to time, update you on the specifics —dates, times, and places, of how Our Lady of Indiana Regional Fraternity will celebrate these events as the information becomes available. The celebration of the "Centenarios" is on the agenda to be discussed at the National Elective Council in one of their business assemblies in Detroit this month, so this topic and how they are celebrated will continue to develop. Hope we can get many of our brothers and sisters as possible involved with our statewide celebration of each of the events during the next four years.

> Letter from the CONFERENCE OF THE FRANCISCAN FAMILY addressed to Franciscans of all Three Orders

"The gift that St. Francis received from the Divine Giver is most fully realized in its complementarity and lively reciprocal communion. This is a motivating force in the lives of "all those who love the Lord with their whole heart" (First Version of the Letter to the Faithful 1, FF 178/1). Therefore, as a Franciscan Family, we invite everyone who is attracted to the evangelical beauty of the Poverello (cf. Laudato si' 10) to join us in celebrating these centenaries. The centenaries offer us a valuable opportunity to invigorate the richness of our charism with a prophetic vision toward the future.

Moreover we want to celebrate them in keeping with the mindset that comes with this gift we have received. Indeed, the hagiographic sources tell us that Francis of Assisi died naked, with nothing of his own: "He asked to be taken to Saint Mary of the Portiuncula so that he might yield up the spirit of life...he threw himself in fervor of spirit totally naked on the naked ground" (Major Legend 14:4, FF 1240). His whole life was a journey of living sine proprio, that is, a life of giving back, from the beginning of his conversion, because only the man who keeps nothing for himself, but gives all of himself, is able to walk in fraternity, guided by his desire for the Supreme Good: "Let us refer all good to the Lord, God Almighty and Most High, acknowledge that every good is His, and thank Him, "from Whom all good comes, for everything." (Earlier Rule 17:17, FF 49).

The Poverello recognized that everything in his life was a free gift of God's love, as he himself affirms in his Testament: "The Lord gave me thus to begin doing penance...the Lord gave me some brothers... the Most High Himself revealed to me that I should live according to the pattern of the Holy Gospel." (Testament 1-14, FF 110 -116). He not only received divine gifts but also chose to give them back, so today, eight hundred years later, we can celebrate these five centenaries as a Franciscan Family. The centenaries invite us to live according to the concept of receiving love and transforming it into self-giving and giving back to others.

Let us begin, sisters and brothers, because now it is up to us to give back to others the gifts that Brother Francis gave to us."

Again, as I read the morning paper, there were the usual stories: Driver charged in hit and run, man pleads guilty to shooting of woman, 82, Lake County coroner rules death of teen a homicide. There are of course some good stories like the man with a metal detector helping a woman who lost her wedding ring at the beach. But too often the news is filled with details of violence, smash and grab, and other crimes.

So, what has this to do with the cats eating breakfast?


