


# Our Regional Prayer

## Celebrating the Incarnation: Greccio 1223—2023



Climbing the steps to the hermitage at Greccio is not for the fainthearted. From the

parking lot to the piazza in front of the entrance is a total of 97 steps to a beautiful setting overlooking the Valley of Rieti

St. Francis's journey to the cave of Greccio took place three years before his death when he was already suffering from various ailments. Though the steps are well cared for now and strongly built, one can only imagine what that climb upward would have been for Francis and his companions. The upward climb would have been dotted with tall cypresses and shivering poplar trees on either side flanked by mountains. Their foot coverings would have left much to be desired.

Fr. Lawrence Zurek, OFM, Conv tells the story this way:

"The road grows narrower, steeper and more winding. On the top of the mountain to the left are the remains of an old castle, and halfway up the mountain to the right is the tiny monastery built up around St Francis' cave where he build the first creche.

St. Francis had already been to the Holy Land and now, as the feast of Christ's birth drew near in this year of 1223, he conceived the idea of making the story of Christmas more vivid in the minds of the shepherds and farmers who live there.

The holy man of Assisi have instructions

for what he wanted and the people joined in enthusiastically. Even Lord Giovanni Vellita, who lived in the castle, joined in. Francis had this cave, and in it there was a rock ledge that he proposed to use for an altar. The peasants brought him an ox and a donkey, and someone brought a little wooden statue of the Child Jesus.

Those who have seen the grotto of the Nativity in Bethlehem are struck by the fact that Francis' cave at Greccio resembles it almost exactly".



Further on, Fr. Lawrence cites the beautiful description of that holy evening as written by Thomas of Celano:

"The human element of the Incarnation and the charity of the Passion were so vivid in his memory that he rarely thought of anything else. In this respect one must recall and praise with reverence what he did at Greccio on the day of Our Lord's nativity, years before he died.

"The time of joy and exultation had come. The friars from different localities had come together and the men and women of the place brought, each according to his means, candles and torches to illuminate that night . . . .Lastly the saint arrived, saw all the preparations and was happy. The crib was put in place, the hay brought in and the ox and donkey led forward. Simplicity was honored, poverty exalted, humility praised, and Greccio became a new Bethlehem.

"For the people and the animals, it seemed

to be full daylight on that delightful night . . . The woods rang with voices and the rocks echoed the hymns of joy.

The solemn rite of the Mass was celebrated over the crib, and the priest enjoyed an unusual consolation the saint, vested as the deacon of the Mass chanted the Gospel. He then preached to the people and said very tender things about the



birth of the poor King and of little Bethlehem. At the end of the solemn vigil, everyone returned to his home full of joy."

### 800th Anniversary Creche at the Vatican: 1223 –2023

The Nativity scene at the Vatican in front of St. Peter's comes from events having taken place in the Diocese of Rieti on the 800th anniversary of St. Francis' first Nativity scene there. In 1203, St. Francis requested that his creche have a live donkey and a live ox, but only figures of these animals will be present at the Vatican.

The creche is simply adorned with representations crafted by the Neapolitan sculptor Antonio Cantone, of Mary, Joseph, the Infant Jesus, and Giovanni Velita, his wife, and the three friars who put a hay-filled manger in a local, stony grotto so that the citizens of Greccio and the surrounding countryside could come to pray. It's roughness and simplicity will surely teach a very visible lesson about the poverty into which Jesus, without putting aside his divinity, was born, became incarnate, one of us.

Behind the statuary, there is a copy of the fresco which now graces the cave at Greccio painted by Giotto in the late 1200's. One can see Francis kneeling in adoration before the baby Jesus while the friars celebrate Mass, Mary is feeding the newborn Savior, while Joseph, the ox and the donkey are looking on in silence and stunned awe at what is taking place before their eyes.

Interestingly, the base on which the creche is erected is in the shape of an octagon to represent the 800the Anniversary of the first creche.



An 80 foot Christmas tree from the area around Turin, decorated with live edelweiss flowers to signify falling snow, also stands in St. Peter's Square near the creche. The edelweiss blossoms come from a nearby nursery since picking them is illegal in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, and Italy.

In 1223, St. Francis chose the area around the mountainous area of Greccio because it reminded him of things he had seen and experienced while in the rocky landscape of the Holy Land.

Francis said, "I would like to remember that Child who was born in Bethlehem, and somehow glimpse with the eyes of my body the hardships he experienced due to the lack of the things necessary for a newborn; how he was laid in a manger and how he lay on the hay between the ox and the donkey", his biographer, Thomas of Celano wrote.

The figures in the Vatican scene are hand-painted, fired clay figures, and they are draped in clothing which would have been worn during the Middle Ages. A small river is included to direct viewers to Jesus as the Font of Life and

Francis's deep respect for all of creation.

Around the colonnade of St. Peter's during this Christmas season there are 120 other creches from twenty two other countries around the world to show the diversity of the creche tradition around the entire planet. Each country and each culture has taken

ownership of this sacred event and depicted it as they experienced it. Further settings can be found in the Paul VI Hall of the Vatican for viewing by visitors.

During this time of deepening and renewal our relationship with Jesus present with us in the Holy Eucharist, the words of St. Francis explaining why the reenactment of the Creche was so important should touch our Franciscan hearts:

"...Behold, each day he humbles Himself as when he came from the royal throne into the Virgin's womb; each day He himself comes down to us, appearing humbly; each day He comes down from the bosom of the Father upon the altar in the hands of the priest. As he revealed himself to the holy apostles in true flesh, so He reveals himself to us now in sacred bread." (Adm 1:16-19)

This stupendous connection was not lost on those creating the creche at St. Peter's Basilica. The following picture shows

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white robed priest with the Sacred Host standing in a direct line with the Manger (to receive the image of Jesus on Christmas day).

In his "Letter to the Entire Order", Francis wrote: "Let everyone be struck with fear, let the whole world tremble, and let the heavens exult when Christ, the Son of the living God, is present on the altar in the hands of a priest! O wonderful loftiness and stupendous dignity! O sublime humility! O humble sublimity! The lord of the universe, God and the Son of God, so humbles himself that for our salvation he hides himself under an ordinary piece of bread! Brothers, look at the humility of God, and pour out your hearts before him! Humble yourselves that you may be exalted by him! Hold nothing back of yourselves for yourselves, that he who gives himself totally to you may receive you totally!" (LtrOrd 26-29)

O Come, let us adore Him!

Here in Our Lady of Indiana Regional Fraternity we have been gifted with our August Unity Day and the graced reflections on the "Rule of 1223" from Fr. Steven Mc Michael, OFM, Conv, and now during Advent of 2023, we've been gifted with an afternoon of prayer and fraternity at the University of St. Francis. In our local fraternities, we are all continuing to read, study, and pray about the gift that St. Francis gave to us 800 years ago. And at the end of the month, a wonderful gathering of friars, sisters, brothers, and friends will assemble at Mt. St. Francis in New Albany for a weekend of prayer and reflection on the gift of Greccio to the Franciscan family.

As we near the final days of Ad-

vent in preparation for Christmas, let us increase our study of the lessons taught us by St. Francis that we might in some small way remember what he did, namely: "For the man saw a little child lying lifeless in the manger and he saw the holy man of God approach the child and waken him from a deep sleep. Nor is this vision unfitting, since in the heart of many the child Jesus has been given over to oblivion (FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 256)."



On Saturday morning, December 16, 2023, the Drama Club from St. Matthew Cathedral School in South Bend, presented their rendition of Thomas of Celano's account of the re-enaction of Christmas by St. Francis at Greccio. They, not only presented a superb and reverent performance, but they had obviously studied the text themselves. Parents, siblings and friends joined Immaculate Conception Fraternity for a morning none will forget.

The usual conditions, of Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff; it is necessary to devoutly participate in the jubilee rites, or at least to pause before the creche prepared there, spending an appropriate span of time in pious meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith and invocations to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph as well as St. Francis of Assisi.

Saint Francis of Assisi, you who loved the poor and humble Christ so much that you wanted to relive in Greccio, with faith and devotion, the night of his birth in Bethlehem, intercede for us so that we can contemplate with a clean heart the beauty of the incarnation of the Son of God and the kindness of his gaze that calls us to a new life. Amen.

"The holy man of God wears a deacon's vestments, for he was indeed a deacon, and he sings the holy gospel with a sonorous voice. And his voice, a sweet voice, a vehement voice, a clear voice, a sonorous voice, invites all to the highest rewards. Then he preaches mellifluously to the people standing about, telling them about the birth of the poor king and the little city of Bethlehem. Often, too, when he wished to mention Jesus Christ, burning with love he called him "the child of Bethlehem," and speaking the word "Bethlehem" or "Jesus," he licked his lips with his tongue, seeming to taste the sweetness of these words.



"The gifts of the Almighty are multiplied here and a marvelous vision is seen by a certain virtuous man. For he saw a little child lying lifeless in the manger, and he saw the holy man of God approach and arouse the child as if from a deep sleep. Nor was this an unfitting vision, for in the hearts of many the child Jesus really had been forgotten, but now, by his grace and through his servant Francis, he had been brought back to life and impressed here by loving recollection. Finally the celebration ended and each returned joyfully home (<u>First Life of St. Francis</u> by Thomas of Celano FA:ED, Vol. 1, p. 255)."
